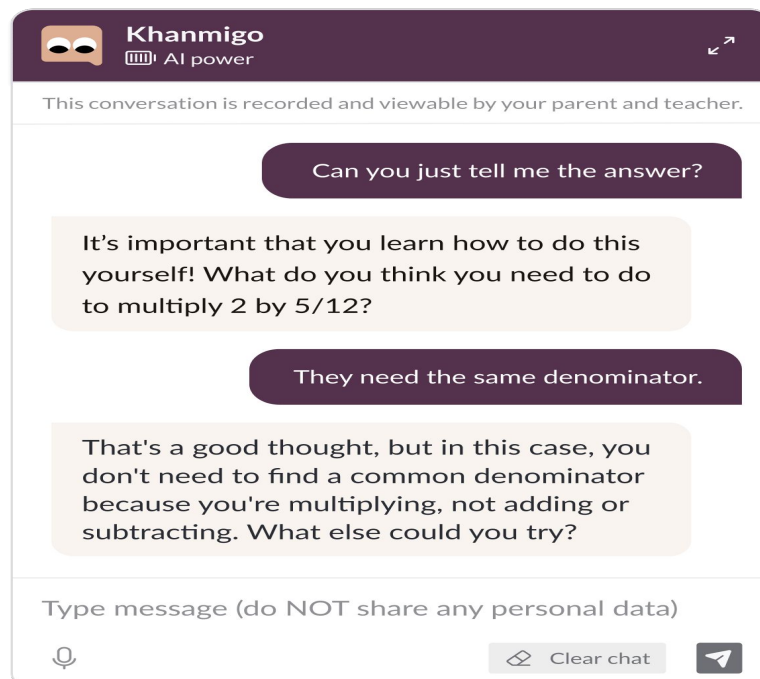
Where twilights hush, where shadows creep,
